

EXPRESSION!

Twitter, Facebook, Snapchat, Instagram, YouTube and countless other social media avenues, allow folks to comment, judge and express opinions about well, everything!

We comment on dramatic political issues, the latest gaffe of a celebrity, the bad driving of the person in front of us on the highway. (I'm particularly guilty of this one...ask my children...)

Expression is powerful. But it's also addictive. We can be tricked into thinking the world needs our opinion. Or that if we exercise any self-control over our expression, somehow we are being censored.

Not true. My best friend of over 30 years, a lawyer, very much on the cusp of all things pertaining to expression, once told me, *"Freedom of expression isn't about the opportunity to say whatever you want, whenever you want. It's about the chance to govern yourself and express that which is best for you, your family and your fellow man."*

Expression can be said to be a tangible 'putting into the world' of ideas and energy. You can uplift, educate, comfort and guide. Or you can litter your environment with negativity and condemnation.

Never in our history have we had access to so much information...so much 'input.' And we each have to find the balance that best suits our lives and our ability to drink in all this information.

Save for email, I do not use social media, much to the dismay of my friends. While I see the advantage of 'keeping up' with everyone, that 'keeping up' could be my full time job! There are so many people, so many details. Confess...couldn't you use a social secretary to navigate the labyrinth just staying connected?

I do not give time to online message boards...they're mostly negative. I've certainly never posted my opinion to one. However, I was tempted to do so the other day. A Yahoo homepage piece enraged me...equally so for the ridiculousness of the content, a piece on a celebrity posting of a questionable picture, as for the bad, inept writing.

I read the other posts of varying opinion and fervor and felt this swell to add my voice to the chorus. I saw the appeal. I could see my name and my opinion there for the whole world. Everyone would be able to soak in my brilliant and clever (or so I think) thoughts.

I paused. Why did I care? Certainly there existed other tasks requiring my attention.

But the draw of being SEEN and HEARD is pretty powerful. I could grasp why folks spend countless hours trolling these kinds of pages and smattering their own 'expression' across the Internet.

Expression. Mmmmmmm. I was reminded of our hospitalized veterans who, in the journey of their rehabilitation and healing, very much deal with the idea of expression.

These men and women are strong, capable, driven, courageous beings who took upon themselves the scope of our freedom and security. They expressed their love for God and Country by putting at risk the very things that made their own lives full. They followed orders. They expressed...and personified...respect, self-motivation and a commitment to mankind.

Now, as they recover, these heroes face the reality that in myriad ways, expression has become difficult. Physical and emotional struggles inhibit their freedom of expression. Things they could do before, without thought, now require a force of commitment or an entirely different approach.

I recall...

- a lady veteran in Florida who would simply raise her arms, field-goal style, after every section Re-Creation sang.
- the gentleman vet who shook a tambourine after each song...but only after the song, not during the music. How considerate!
- the older audience who, instead of applauding, rang bells joyously!
- another veteran patient who pounded his wheelchair tray very vigorously as his own version of clapping.
- still another veteran who shouted 'lovely' in lieu of applauding...even after the high energy 50's section!
- many times, seeing our hospitalized heroes wave American flags after each song.
- And on this past VA tour, our soprano, Madison, experienced a new 'expression...'

"I wasn't quite sure what was happening. I heard a man yelling after each song. I didn't know if he needed help or was just expressing himself. All kinds of things have happened during a show. So, I was concerned, but not overly so. I soon realized he was yelling "APPLAUSE" after every section!! He could not physically 'clap' but he was so moved by the show he was busting to express himself...so he yelled "APPLAUSE." It was so touching. I spoke to him afterward and he said he simply wanted to show as much appreciation to us as we had to him. I will never forget that!"

We experience this type of "expression" all the time. Vets will try and stand to salute the flag, alarming the nursing staff, who know they should not attempt such an endeavor. But the vets resolve, their desire to express, is so great, that they try, despite the limits on their bodies.

Interesting too, are the folks who see Re-Creation at a commercial show and learn of the veteran mission for the first time. Often they will interact with us at the end of the program. They're trying to talk, but they can't. So overwhelmed with the care Re-Creation provides the vets, they simply can't express themselves.

Sometimes, it turns into a type of "emotional charades"...

I recall...

- The "no sound 'thank you'" - So many people have taken my hand in a hearty handshake and tried to say 'thank you' for the program, but they simply can't muster a sound. Streaming tears and a pat on the shoulder are all they can command.

- The "fan the face" gesture. You know this one. Think of the old southern gesture of 'getting the vapors'...or any bride finding her gown on "Say Yes to the Dress" and you'll know what I mean. Grown-ups who simply stand before us at the exit of the show crying and fanning.

- The 'attitude adjustment.' This is my absolute favorite. A man at a recent show took the liberty of expressing himself to me and to Taylor, our sound technician, his expectations of the show. He forcefully, belligerently, informed us that if it was too loud that he and his party would leave. He outlined his parameters for our show as far as length, song-selection and intermission preference. (Note* He was not in charge of the event, but I listened to his demands and went about my business.) At the end of the program, this very same man approached me, put his hand on my shoulder and pounded my chest with his palm. He was sobbing. Not crying... sobbing. He tried to speak and simply dropped his head. His wife patted his shoulder and turned to me and said, "We had no idea what we were coming to see tonight. He's a veteran himself and he is just so grateful you're doing this for the guys. Thank You." This gentleman looked up, pounded my chest for emphasis and walked away. Wow.

Expression takes all forms. Some folks hand us a donation. Others buy a CD or DVD. Still others ask how Re-Creation can sing for their church or civic group.

The most intrigued and motivated ask how they can best help the young people themselves...and that gives us the chance to explain F.O.R-C.E.S.

FRIENDS OF RE-CREATION EXTENDING SERVICE

Friends of Re-Creation Extending Service continues to be our main-

line of equipping these young people as they serve in the VA Federal, State and Private homes across America!

FORCES members commit \$365.00 a year, a dollar a day, to the organization. That money is NOT used for general expenses. We distribute those funds to the group members in the form of a federally-recognized stipend to help them



offset the expenses of a year-long mission tour.

Remember, RC cast members sing about 320 shows a year. They have no other job.

Touring with Re-Creation is not a hobby. It is a 13-month commitment of service!

The members of FORCES have been consistent, yet we remain low in our ability to provide the young people with adequate funding. As of now, we give them about \$5.50 a meal. And that does not include the expenses they incur for personal items, like toiletries,



make-up, snacks etc. Our ability to equip these dedicated ambassadors is crucial. One of the common expressions of concern we hear from F.O.R-C.E.S. members is, "Well, you're not around enough for us to come to a show. It's hard to get people on-board when we can't get to a program to show them what Re-Creation is all about."

A valid point.

And we are aware. But with over 250 veterans facilities clamoring for Re-Creation programs, scheduling becomes problematic. But we're working on it.

And let me tell you that this summer offers a number of great opportunities for you to ask a co-worker, a friend or family member to join you at a Re-Creation show.



You get them there, we will do the rest! Witnessing the energy of the show, meeting the kids in the group, getting to ask any questions...all of these elements I know will intrigue your guests.

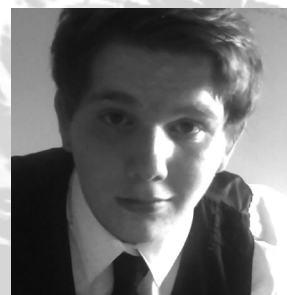
